


<p>1. <u>Things to consider when making a movie:</u></p> <p>A lot goes into making movies and here are a few things to consider when planning and making your own:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• What is the content of your movie? What genre does it fall into?• Location—where will your film be set?• Props— what costumes, items and objects will you need to create your movie?• Sound—will you have sound effects within your movie? Will you need a soundtrack?	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Panning - swivelling a still or video camera horizontally from a fixed position.2. Tracking - any shot where the camera follows backward, forward or moves alongside the subject being recorded.3. Running time—the length of duration of a film.4. Genre—a category i.e. comedy, thriller, horror, romance etc.5. Trim – to take off either the beginning or the end of a video clip6. Split – cutting a video clip into separate pieces7. Transition – Connecting one shot to another
<p>2. <u>The purpose of camera angles</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Camera shots are the building blocks of film, and shot selection has a huge impact on the way a viewer interprets the action on screen.• There are a number of different angles you can consider using when making movies: <p>⇒ Extreme close up—where an object, item or body part fills the frame. This angle can heighten emotion.</p> <p>⇒ Close up—shows the character from the shoulder to the top of the head, good for capturing facial expressions.</p> <p>⇒ Mid shot—shows the character from waist to the top of the head. Used for facial expression and capturing body language.</p> <p>⇒ Long shot—shows the full length of the body from feet to top of head. Used to show the character in relation to their surroundings.</p> <p>⇒ Extreme long/wide shot—establishing shot at the start of a film or scene.</p>	
<p>3. <u>How to import and edit videos in iMovie</u></p>	
<p>1. Import video</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Click on create movie, this will allow you to add any videos already on your device. If you later want to add more photos/videos click the '+' icon	
<p>2. Split video</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Find the point where you want to split a video and tap 'split'	
<p>3. Trim video</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Tap on the video so it Highlights yellow.- Drag it to the point you'd like the clip to start/end	
	<p>4. Add transitions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Tap the icon in between clips and choose your preferred transition
